## Ijazat movie ringtone

Apple's iPhone comes with a healthy selection of ringtones that you can use to customize your mobile experience. You can set a variety of global ringtones or choose to go with different ringtones for individuals, different groups of friends and more. (Image credit: Apple) But what if you want to go a little further and convert one of your favorite songs into a ringtone that you can use on your iPhone? Of course, there are several free ringtone apps in the wild that give you the opportunity to quickly create new ringtones. But in many cases, applications don't come with all the features you'd expect to make creating a ringtone quick and easy. And in some cases, you'll even have to spend a few dollars just to be able to choose the part of a song you want. So if you're serious about making a ringtone, there's a better way. It just takes some time and various steps to make it happen. Read more and learn how to make ringtones for your iPhone:1. Open iTunes on the desktop to get started.2. Select the song you want to use to create a ringtone and click it.3. Right-click the song and select Song Info.4. Click the Options tab.5. Select up to a period of 30 seconds in the song that you want to make your ringtone. Apple limits your ringtone to 30 seconds, so you won't be able to have anything more than that. When you choose your time, make sure you set the time in minutes and seconds. So if you want to start the ringtone in 1 minute and 34 seconds, enter 1:34 in the starting field. Then set it to finish 30 seconds later at 2:04. Once you've selected your times, be sure to play it to make sure it's the song track you really want.6. Click OK.7. With the song highlighted, click the file &gt; convert and select the option that says Create an AAC version. Apple iTunes will instantly convert the 30-second audio clip you just chose to create.8. Right-click the ringtone you just created, and on a Mac, select Show in Finder. On a Windows computer, look for the song in the Windows Explorer window to find its location on your hard disk.9. Change the song's file extension .m4a to .m4r. That's because Apple uses an .m4r extension for ringtones instead of the well-known .m4a. When you are asked to either .m4a or go with .m4r, select the last one.10. Keep your window open and connect your iPhone to your computer. You will see the pop up in the left sidebar of the screen.11. Drag and drop the .m4r ringtone you just created onto the option in the left sidebar, below your iPhone, which says Tones. You will then be seen under the ringtones section on your iPhone.12. Go to your iPhone and click Settings.13. Under Settings, choose Sounds & Tying.14. Scroll down to Ringtone and tap this option.15. Here, you should see your ringtone. Select it. The ringtone should also be played so you can be sure it worked properly and everything is good to go. Credit: Tom Ringtones' guide allows you to customize your iPhone with tunes and sounds you like, even you can assign specific ringtones to your various contacts. The easiest way to add a ringtone to your iPhone is to buy it in the iTunes Store, usually for 99 cents or \$1.29. But if you prefer not to spend money, create free ringtones using songs you already own, or visit a website that offers free, legal ringtones for download. The information in this article applies to any iPhone. While it takes some effort, it's possible to create a new ringtone from a song you already have in your iTunes library. To do this, select a song that belongs to you and that is stored on your local hard disk. Your song can't be in the cloud or streamed over the internet. You can't create ringtones from songs in your library that were downloaded with Apple Music; the song must be purchased from iTunes or imported from a CD you own. Decide on a song in the iTunes library. The maximum length of a ringtone is 40 seconds. For text message tones, the maximum length is 30 seconds. Mac users: Choose Preferences &gt; iTunes &gt; General. Windows users: Choose Edit Preferences &gt; &gt; General. At the bottom of the window, click Insert Settings. In the Import Settings window, go to the Setup drop-down list. (Note which setting is currently selected so that you can go back to the end of this process and restore it to your original selection.) Select High Quality (128 kbps) from the menu, and then click OK. Make sure you also select AAC as the import format if it's not already. Locate your song in the iTunes library. Listen to it and note the start and end times of the clip you want to make on ringtone. Right-click the song and select Song Info. Select the Options tab. Enter the start and stop times you noted in the available fields. Choose OK. On the iTunes menu, choose File &gt; Convert &gt; Create AAC Version. This will create a new file with only the snippet between the start and stop times you specify. Find the newly created music clip file in iTunes (it will have the same name as the original song but with a short time). Right-click the new file and click Show in Finder. In the Finder window, right-click the new file and click Rename. Change the extension from m4a to m4r (m4r is the file extension for ringtones) and press enter. You have now created a new ringtone! You won't need the clip in your iTunes library so you can remove it. In iTunes, right-click the new file name and choose Delete from Library, asked if you want to delete this song from the iTunes library, select Delete Song. When asked if you want to move the song to trash, click Keep File. When you're done creating the ringtone, return and remove the start and stop times in the original song and reset the original input settings. In the iTunes library, select the original song file. Right-click the song and select Song Info. Click the Options tab and clear the boxes next to start and stop. Click OK. Choose iTunes (on Mac) or Edit (on Windows PC) &gt; &gt; General. Select Insert Settings. Select the Setup drop-down list and select your original setting. Now that you've created your ringtone file, add it to your iPhone. Connect your iPhone to your computer. (Unlock your iPhone if prompted.) At the top of the iTunes window, select your iPhone. In the left sidebar, under On my device, click Tones. If the left sidebar isn't visible in iTunes, choose View &gt; Show Sidebar. From the finder window, drag the new ringtone m4r file to iTunes and drop it in the Tones folder. At the bottom of the iTunes window, click Sync. When synchronization is complete, the new ringtone will be with all other ringtones on your iPhone. If you want to go beyond iTunes, there are websites that offer ringtones for free. The problem, however, is to make sure that your source is actually both free and legal (not limited to use by copyright). Here are some websites that offer legitimate free ringtones. These sites also offer other content, such as videos, games, apps, and wallpapers. The Zedge website offers a wide range of ringtones, including songs, tones and other random sounds and effects. (Wallpapers are mixed with offers.) There's a Zedge app for Android users in the Google Play Store, which offers ringtones and wallpapers. Zedge's iPhone app, however, only offers wallpapers. Tones7 has a nice range of ringtone types and a long enough list of categories to make browsing for the perfect ringtone easier. Still, these aren't going to be Billboard's top hits. Notification sounds provide ringtones that are generated in a composition. If you're looking for beeps, whoops, and Martian ray guns, this is the place for you. When downloading files from any website, consider legal considerations. The content itself usually provides clues. For example, if a site hosts free ringtones from the most recent songs at the top of the chart, then it's probably best to stay away. Ringtones allow you to express yourself beyond the normal chirping, ringing, and radar sounds everyone else uses. With a little effort, the songs you love will customize your iPhone experience. A ringtone is the sound your phone makes when there is an incoming call. Ringtones are available in many different sounds. Although your phone comes with a few ringtones, you can download additional ringtones directly from your mobile phone service provider or from one of the many web sites that offer ringtones [source: Beck]. This requires you to connect your phone to the Internet via wireless. There are different types of ringtones, including: Music Sounds Your phone will play part of a tune every time it rings. Voice tones You'll hear a recorded voice every time there's an incoming call. Sounds You will hear sound effects when the phone rings [source: ATT].
